



## Julius and Ethel Bergman

This scholarship was established to honor the memory of Julius and Ethel Bergam. A few details of their lives were discovered when the history of the scholarship was researched. Julius Bergman lived from December 5, 1897 to May 21, 1992. Ethel Bergman was born January 13, 1909 and died April 3, 1983. Both were Jewish and are buried at Rosehill Cemetery according to internment.net and billiongraves.com. The following clip was discovered in the Tulsa World, April 3, 1983 as well an article from the Tulsa Tribune, July 13, 1927.
