In his will, he expressed his desire to create a non-profit organization that would benefit the community he loved so dearly. His brother, Brian Bowles, made Greg's dream a reality when he co-founded the Gregory G. Bowles Foundation.

Greg believed in the transformational power of community-focused initiatives. His foundation aims to partner with other organizations and foundations to amplify its reach, exploring joint ventures that reflect Greg's spirit of collaboration.

What sets the Gregory G. Bowles Foundation apart is its commitment to the "little guy"—the overlooked and underserved. While many foundations focus on grand, sweeping initiatives, Greg's legacy emphasizes inclusivity and the importance of addressing the smaller, yet equally vital, needs of individuals.
